HARRY C. MOORE LIBRARY OPENS

Former LCF Chairman's Dream Becomes a Reality



A beacon that symbolizes Bahamian scholarship and national development, the Harry C. Moore Library and Information Centre — named after the former Lyford Cay Foundation Chairman, a man who devoted his life to the advancement of education — was officially opened at The College of The Bahamas (COB) on April 8, 2011.

The library's operations, focus and impact will extend far beyond the boundaries of the tertiary institution, in honour of Mr. Moore's legacy and The College's mission. The opening was an historic day for many people, including the COB community, national leaders and friends and supporters of The College and the Foundations.

"The possibilities provided by the Harry C. Moore Centre are boundless," said Rt. Hon. Hubert A. Ingraham, Prime Minister of The Commonwealth of The Bahamas. "They include expanded distance learning, connecting

students at COB with universities around the world, and integrating communications technologies in various academic disciplines."

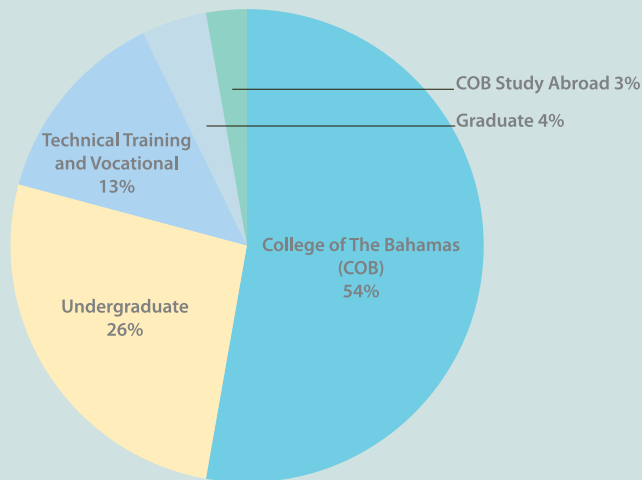
The \$28 million library was constructed to meet the needs of a growing student population, the expansion of baccalaureate and master degree programmes and the increased demand for library services and holdings by the College community and the public.

The late Harry C. Moore was an outstanding friend of COB and advocate of the library project. He worked tirelessly to persuade members of the Lyford Cay Foundations and friends to contribute. To date, through the generosity of our benefactors, the Foundations have donated \$2.5 million toward furniture, fixtures and equipment for the new facility, and \$1.5 million to the College's Virtual Library.

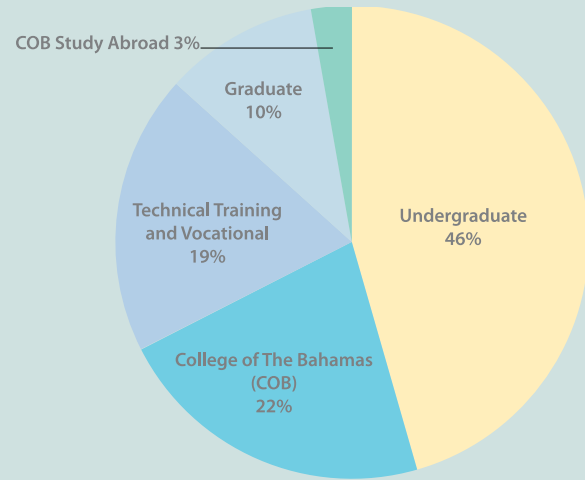

FOCUS: A NEW INITIATIVE

FOCUS, our new school enrichment programme, targets motivated, underserved public school students in Grades 5 – 12, providing them with a total of 45 additional days of formal learning each year, as well as transportation to and from lessons, uniform T-shirts, class materials, meals, counseling services and mentoring, free of charge. Its aim is to help a larger number of Bahamian youngsters better prepare for higher education and career success.

The groundbreaking programme also provides unique internship opportunities for aspiring teachers. **One of the key attributes of FOCUS is ‘students teaching students’ — high achieving college students have been recruited to teach the children and act as role models, under the guidance of experienced educators.** Student teachers bring great energy, enthusiasm, a love for learning and a fresh approach to the task of education and serve as examples of how “it’s cool to be smart”. It is hoped that the training and experiences provided by FOCUS will encourage a significant number of the intern teachers to

eventually become education professionals.

The first FOCUS class, made up of 30 children who had just completed Grade 4, began on July 7, 2011, at The College of The Bahamas (COB), which generously donated use of their premises for this purpose. It was a day marked by great excitement and anticipation by all concerned, with more than one parent saying that their child had been up and ready to leave the house as early as dawn.

“This is a huge opportunity for all of us,” said Felicity Humblestone, Programme Director. ***“I jumped at the chance to be a part of a project like this, because I really think it’s doing***



something special. It is a fantastic opportunity for our intern teachers; they are excited. They want a chance to flex their teaching skills. They, and the mentor teachers who are monitoring their progress, are hugely appreciative to be a part of this. We are all going to be learning a lot.

The FOCUS programme, which has been created and developed with the collegial assistance of Breakthrough Miami, will consist of a six-week summer programme held Monday through Friday; lessons each Saturday from April to October, and, eventually, an 'On Course to College' module designed to assist 10th – 12th graders in selecting and preparing for senior high school and a postsecondary education.

A new class of rising fifth graders will be added every summer, and FOCUS will stay with the youngsters until they graduate from high school: a full nine-year commitment. The rigorous selection process included application sessions and interviews with parents and the children.

Clearly, the degree of commitment on the part of the students' families will be a critical factor in the success of the programme. For that reason, the mentoring aspect of FOCUS stresses ongoing communication with and support for parents and guardians. "We are all accountable to one another," said Ms. Humblestone. "We all need to work together. We are in a relationship of mutual respect, and everyone understands that excellence is our standard."

The response by family members has so far exceeded all expectations, with many of them taking every opportunity to visit the COB campus to participate in different FOCUS events. Dora Chisolm, aunt and guardian of Edwin Simmons, 9, was thrilled to take part in a 'Family Morning' recently and expressed her gratitude for all the programme offers.

"When Edwin came to live with me I told him that he had to go to college, but I told him I didn't know how he was going to go," she said. "And the next thing we knew, he was one of the successful candidates. We are just so appreciative that he has an opportunity now to go to college. It's a great opportunity, so we're just going to be there for him to encourage him, so that he can achieve his goals and even help and encourage other students, that they can do it too."

FOCUS has already had a transformative effect on the lives of the participants. "The programme hadn't even started yet and I'd already learned a ton," said mentor teacher Adam

Thibault, who was asked to devise the English Language Arts and Social Studies curriculum. ***"And I've seen tremendous progress on the part of the students and the intern teachers in just the few weeks that we've been doing this. I've noticed great energy, enthusiasm, attendance, humour and intelligence, and it has been very neat to watch."***

"The training we received at Breakthrough Miami was really, really exciting," said intern teacher Lizinga Rolle, a second year English Education major at COB. ***"We learned something called, 'Say, See, Do'. It's where the teacher says something and the students see what the teacher is saying, through visual aids. And then the students actually do it, so that they remember what they are taught, and at the same time they have fun doing it. They have fun learning, they have fun writing, they are excited, they are energized, they are ready to go at all times."***

"I think what I like about the teachers is when they give us homework and then the homework is not too difficult," said eight-year-old Stephen Dean. "I should go to college because it is going to help me to get a career, have a job, have a family."

At the end of the first day of class, one student wrote an anonymous note on the 'Wish Board' posted in one of the classrooms. It read: ***"I wish to have a better life than I did before and I think with the help of FOCUS it will get much better."***

The Foundations have great hopes for the class of 2019 and greatly look forward to watching the children's progress during this exciting new adventure.

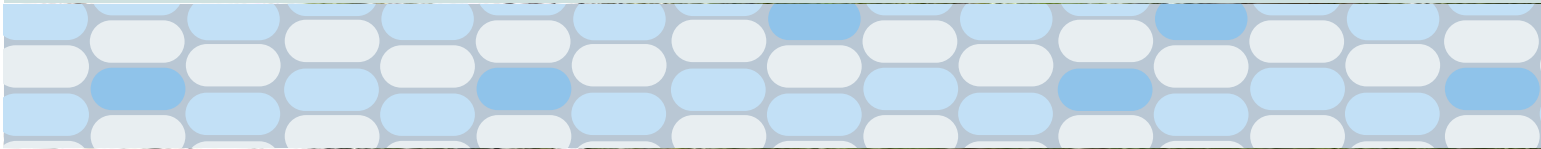

OUR FIRST-EVER SPEAKER SERIES

The Foundations were pleased to launch College Connection: The Speaker Series recently, with a group of special presentations by Dr. David T. Conley, Chief Executive Officer of the Educational Policy Improvement Center, Professor of Educational Policy and Leadership and Founder of the Center for Educational Policy Research at the University of Oregon.

Approximately 700 people turned out for the two-day event, which included three specialized seminars — for leaders in education, teachers and counselors, and representatives from tertiary institutions and the business community — as well as a free public forum.

Based on the research that he and his team have conducted in the United States and elsewhere, Dr. Conley described how the rapidly changing world offers tremendous opportunities for The Bahamas to grow and thrive as a nation. Like so many other sectors, he explained, education has become globally competitive, and all countries need to take a close look at how best to adapt their educational systems to meet the future needs of their citizens. Every person has a role in charting the path, Dr. Conley believes, including teachers, business leaders, community members, parents and students. Each of the professor's presentations was followed by a spirited question-and-answer session and a discussion led by a local moderator — including former Foundation scholars — on how the facts presented related to The Bahamas.

“During my visit to Nassau I was struck time and again by the pent-up energy and enthusiasm among the audiences for substantial educational improvement,” said Dr. Conley.

“I was so impressed with the dedication and commitment to improving education and the solid foundation upon which

reform can be built. I really think the time is right for The Bahamas' educational system to make the leap to becoming the best in the region and comparable to the best in the world. I see a very bright educational future for the country.”

The Speaker Series was officially opened by Dr. Leon Higgs, Director of Higher Education and Lifelong Learning at the Ministry of Education, who represented the Hon. T. Desmond Bannister, Minister of Education, and Mrs. Elma I. Garraway, the Ministry's Permanent Secretary.

Dr. Higgs thanked the Foundations for organising Dr. Conley's presentations and for the many partnerships that we have built with the Ministry over the years.

“In this age of global economic uncertainty, students must be given the skills that they need to make career and employment changes as the environment dictates,” he said. “Our educational system must prepare our students for life beyond the school campus, whether they are pursuing post secondary education at a college or university, at a technical school, or at making the transition to the world of work. It is our hope that as a result of these two days, all of us ... have been armed with strategies that enable us to equip students with 21st century skills and knowledge. It is also our hope that on our return to our various institutions that we will proactively implement the strategies with which we have been armed. Parents, teachers, guidance counselors, school administrators, and education policy makers, it is important that we act and act now.”

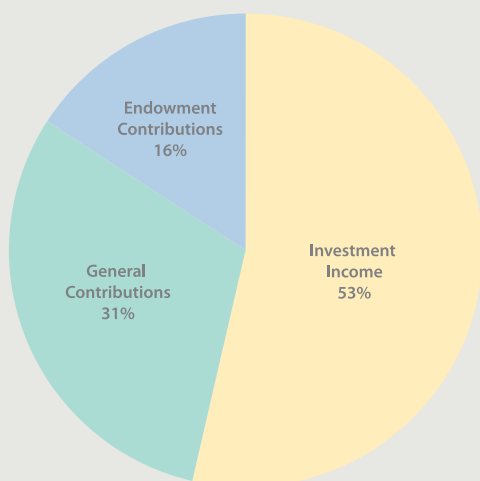

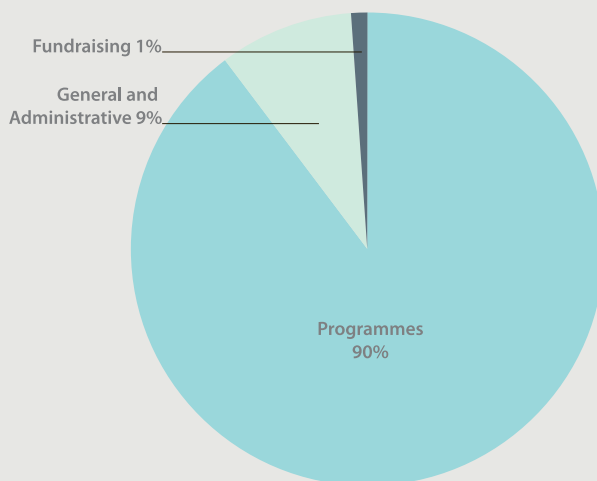

MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENTS *continued*

Mr. Moore's widow, Mrs. Monique Moore and her family were honoured for their dedication and contributions, as were the scores of devoted champions and donors of the Library initiative. We are thrilled for The Bahamas that the Library is open and actively drawing users every single day.

Our **scholarship programmes** thrived in spite of ongoing economic challenges. In 2010/11 we were able to grant 80 new awards — 39 for study abroad and 41 for students attending The College of The Bahamas — and renew our support of 130 scholarships already in the system.

The Canadian Lyford Cay Foundation (CLCF) was pleased to continue its funding of distance-learning scholarships for Bahamians at Ryerson University, and to add new awards of increased value in order to better assist students meet the rising cost of tertiary education in Canada. Going forward, all new scholarships offered by the CLCF will be valued at a minimum of Cdn\$10,000.

2011 also marked the start of an exciting educational initiative targeting motivated, underserved public school students. **FOCUS** ("Forward and Onward to College, Upward to Success") was introduced as an enrichment programme for rising fifth graders in July of 2011, and will remain with these students year-round until their graduation from Grade 12, providing them with an additional 45 days of formal learning annually. Every summer, a new class of children who are about to enter Grade 5 will be added.

FOCUS has been well received by the Ministry of Education, the principals, teachers and guidance counselors at participating schools, committed donors and, most importantly, the students and their parents/guardians. We are enthusiastic about all the early signs of support from recipients and givers alike, and expect that the growth of the programme will enable us to continue to provide tertiary level scholarships to the young people who need them the most and, given their aptitude and determination, are deserving of help and encouragement to pursue postsecondary studies.

College Connection: The Speaker Series, also launched in 2011, aims to ensure that the desired multiplier effect is exponentially high when it comes to sharing best practices and critical knowledge with professional educators. The programme brings together all of the stakeholders in our educational system, including parents and students, and allows them to spend time together with leading experts. The inaugural lectures, on college and career readiness, were led by Dr. David T. Conley, Professor of Educational Policy and Leadership at the University of Oregon. All sessions were extremely well attended, including one that was standing room only.

In 2010, we also disbursed \$3,044,993 in **grants** — including \$2.5 million to facilitate the purchase of furniture, fixtures and equipment for the Harry C. Moore Library — by far the highest level ever. The Gifts and Grants Committee continues to penetrate our greater community, lending support to organisations that consistently improve the lives of Bahamians. It does so by visiting not-for-profit entities, conducting financial due diligence, assessing needs, teaming up with credible partners and ultimately making recommendations to the LCF Board of Directors. The Committee also guarantees a transparent reporting process.

On a personal note, we wish to thank **Mr. Stuart W. Ray** for his service as LCF President for the past four years. It was with great sadness that the Board of Directors accepted Mr. Ray's decision to step down from this position in March of 2011. We are grateful for his guidance on further institutionalizing our fundraising efforts, for ushering in an era of original programming, and providing sound financial leadership in a most tenuous economic environment. We are highly pleased that Mr. Ray has chosen to remain a Board Director.

As a parting note, we mourn the loss of former Board member and Chair of our Education Committee, **Dr. Keva Bethel**. She was our colleague, mentor, supporter and friend, as well as one of the leading educators in The Bahamas and the region. We also note with sorrow the passing of our Board members **Mrs. Judith Loeb Chiara, Mr. William Holowesko** and **Mrs. LaRita Boren**. All of these persons will continue to inspire us for years to come.

On behalf of our Chairman, Mr. Manuel J. Cutillas, and our Boards of Directors, we thank you for your interest, commitment and financial gifts. The Foundations draw a great deal of strength and focus in knowing that we count with your support.
